EDITORIAL APRIL 2022

FROM THE ARCHIVES

We publish reports from the Acton Turville Parish Council every month in Local Talk Back but here's something a bit different – a report from the Parish Council meeting held in June 1979.

ACTON TURVILLE PARISH COUNCIL

The first meeting of the new Parish Councillors took place on Tuesday 12th June 1979 at the Old School, Acton Turville. Mrs Walton was elected Chairman and Mr Wayman Vice Chairman. The retiring chairman Mr Crook took the chair until the new chairman was elected, and then he left the meeting. The new chairman Mrs Walton said that a letter should be sent to Mr Crook thanking him for his services to the Parish as a councillor for the last 30 years.

Mr Crook came into the village in 1945 and took over the Fox & Hounds. In 1949 it was decided to form a Parish Council and 9 candidates put up for election, 5 were elected and at the first meeting on 4th October those present were Councillor G A Minty (Chairman), Councillor A M Carson (Vice Chairman) Mr H Crook, Mr R C Broomsgrove and Mr R. H Herding, also present was Mr H A Mizen deputy clerk to Sodbury Rural District Council and Mr Hayes as clerk to the Parish Meeting. Mr Crook informed me that when they held their first meeting nobody turned up except the councillors and this was the pattern for the next few years, but he thought there was more interest shown nowadays in the affairs of the Parish. Mr Crook was a Rural District Councillor for 23 years and chairman of planning for 6 years. Mr Crook said his reason for not putting up for election this time is because he is now 74 years old and would be 79 by the time the next election would take place.

I know most of the villagers would like to add their thanks to him for his help and advice through the years. Thank you Harry,

The next meeting of the Parish Council will take place on Monday 16th July 1979 at the Old School, Acton Turville at 6.30 pm.

A TRIBUTE TO HILARY PETERS

In last month's Local Talk Back, the Reverend Richard Thomson, in his Vicar's Letter, mentioned the sad passing of Hilary Peters who lived in Worcester Lodge. There is no doubt she was an extraordinary lady who had experienced such a varied lifestyle, so through various articles written about her, and memories from a few locals, I have put together a condensed version of her amazing life.

Generous, eccentric, author, recluse, nomad, are just a few of the words that could be used to describe Hilary. Born in 1939 in London she was the daughter of A.D Peters, a wealthy literary agent. With war looming, and the dangers that living in London meant, for its duration she went to live in Oxfordshire. When the war was over, she returned to London and attended the independent Francis Holland School for girls in Sloane Square. From 1958-1962 she went to St Anne's College, Oxford where she read Theology which fuelled a life-long passion for religion and the inner life which led her to study Vipassana meditation. It is said that she would begin each day with an hour spent watching her breath.



It was after her time at the college that her life was to take many twists and turns. Although given a large sum of money by her wealthy father, she preferred to embrace a simpler lifestyle, and would either give much of her wealth away or put it into projects that benefitted others, in particular projects that encouraged urban people to connect more with nature. In c1963 she took a lease on a house on the Ballast Quay at Greenwich in which she kept chickens, and at nearby Blackheath she had some goats. At around the same time, she transformed her partner's old barge that was moored in a nearby dock, into a floating showroom for their stone display garden, and as a retail outlet for their goat's milk, eggs, fruit, vegetables and honey.

Her first, more widely-known venture was transforming an old commercial site on the River Thames into a nursery garden, which it is said continues to attract visitors to this day. After the nursery garden project, she moved on to starting a city farm on land on the former Surrey docks site. In 1978 she wrote a book called "Docklandscape" which plots the story of that dockland venture. Once the farm was handed over to the local authorities to continue running, she moved on to her own more personal adventures, the first of which was to buy a narrow boat and tour the United Kingdom's canal system, which she duly did over the following years, becoming quite an expert on the subject. Once her canal tours were achieved, she then swapped her canal boat for a converted ambulance and went on a 10-year road tour of the country, from Cornwall to Scotland. During that tour she enjoyed visiting many buildings, in particular churches and follies, as well as going to see many of the country's most beautiful landscapes.

As well as the more published feats already mentioned, she was involved in a variety of other things. These included a period as one-time editor of the Follies magazine, and joining farmers by being at the forefront in the protests against what she saw as the needless slaughter of livestock during the Foot & Mouth epidemic. On the human side, she was a regular visitor to prisons to comfort and chat with inmates, and at home her doors were always open for anyone seeking refuge for a few days.



It would appear she found her way to our area while on her road travels, several residents recalling seeing her converted vehicle, distinctive by the chimney sticking out the top, being parked up periodically by Hinnegar Wood, which was both peaceful and handy for gathering wood for her fire.

With her love for old buildings, landscapes, nature and her mainly solitude lifestyle, it was perhaps fitting she spent the final 15 years or so of her life in the beautiful 18th century Worcester Lodge with its magnificent view looking down the avenue towards Badminton Park and House, and surrounded by woods, fields and the wildlife she loved so much.

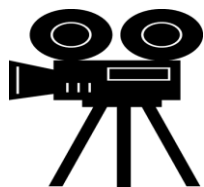
BEAUFORT HUNT CHARITY DONATIONS

On March 4th at their annual Meet in Sopworth, Wiltshire, the Beaufort Hunt presented cheques for £5,000 each to the Wiltshire Air Ambulance and the Youth Action Wiltshire organisations. These donations coming from funds raised at last years Christmas Fair.

The Wiltshire Air Ambulance needs little introduction, it's fast emergency service often being vital for saving lives. FROM THE ARCHIVES

The area around Badminton has featured in many films and television productions over the years. The 2001 epic Pearl Harbor, starring Ben Afflek, was filmed in the park in front of Badminton House, and more recently we had Netflix filming the period drama Bridgerton in and around Badminton. Even Pam Eyres paid a visit last year to film part of her TV series on the Cotswolds.

Back in the late 1980s, one of the most popular series on television was Miss Marple, starring Joan Hickson in the title role. Miss Marple's investigations would take her all around the country, and the many-and-varied filming locations were a major part of the programme's appeal. In 1986, Miss Marple and her entourage descended on the village of Badminton, where they would shoot scenes that appeared in an episode called Nemesis. The plot revolved around a cryptic letter requesting Miss Marple's help to right an unknown injustice, the only clue being a ticket for a guided tour of stately homes and gardens including Hidcote Manor and Berkeley Castle. A number of scenes were also filmed in local villages including Marshfield, but when they needed a village shop the production company chose Drewett's Stores in Badminton which at the time was being run by Mike Luter.

As can be seen in the pictures below taken by Yvonne Nettles, a lot of work went into getting every detail right for the filming. According to the report in Local Talk Back, "the interior of the shop was transformed with a 'makeover' in preparation for the filming. Shelves were painted to look like brown wood and the freezer was covered to look like a counter. The Post Office counter, for filming, was rebuilt in a different location inside the shop. The window display and outdoor display was arranged to match the era of the story."

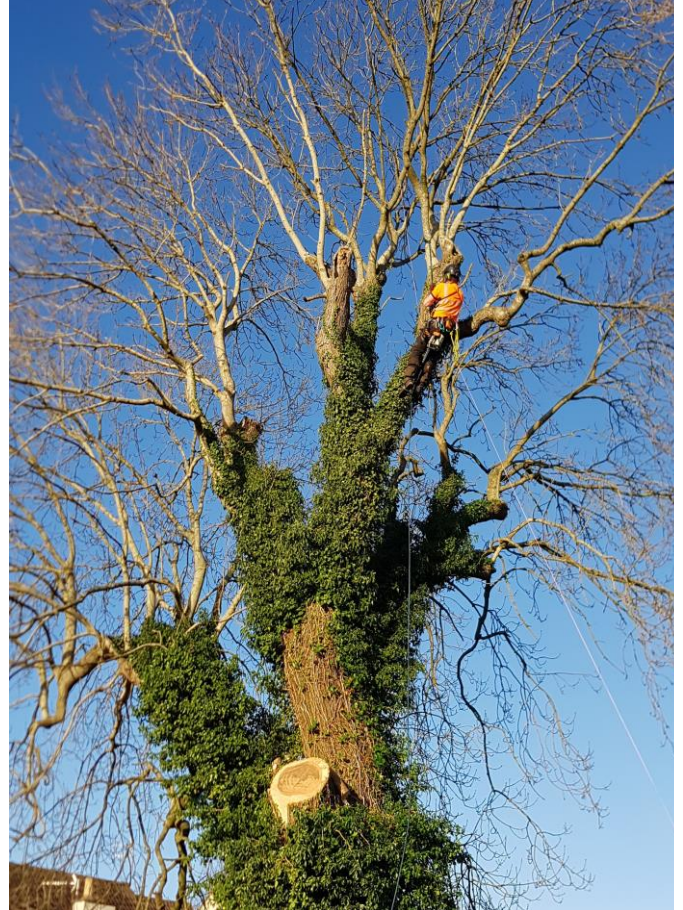
Nemesis was transmitted in two parts on Sunday 8 February and Sunday 15 February at 7.45pm on BBC1, and the February edition of Local Talk Back included a message from the BBC which read: "The BBC hope you will enjoy watching the programme as much as they did making it and would like to thank the villagers for their co-operation in the making of Miss Marple."

After losing a large branch back in 2021, it was clear the ash tree located between the school and play area in Acton Turville was on borrowed time. Closer inspection by the Badminton Estate's tree expert revealed signs of ash die-back, so arrangements were made very efficiently to have the tree felled. Sybil Haddrell and Mark Studden were on hand to record the final hours of this once-majestic great ash.

In its place, two oak saplings have been planted as part of an initiative called the Queen's Green Canopy which aims to mark the Queen's Platinum Jubilee and enhance the environment by planting three million saplings. These have been issued free of charge to local groups and communities.

April 2022 Letter from the Vicar

Dear Parishioners,

Last month I shared with you what I consider to make a saint. We are now in Lent, and the picture has darkened as we have watched the sad and horrific events unfolding in Ukraine. Mirrored as they are, by the Christian story moving towards the crucifixion on Good Friday.

No matter how well we think we are doing, or how hard we try to keep things peaceful, sin always has the propensity to break out and cause destruction and hurt. J J'S GARDENING BLOG



Just a reminder that we are not clear of cold short sharp weather until May, so if you have bought lots of colourful annuals treat them with care. Keep them cosseted in a green house, cold frame or inside and water with tepid water. Sometimes, it is a good plan to place your requirements right now with a local nursery, collecting your small young plants when they will be a little more robust. Acclimatise these plants over a few days: popping them outside on sunny days and putting them back under cover about four or five o'clock towards evening.

Feeding Time

Established plants would like a feed. Hedges, young trees, large shrubs can be given a handful of blood, fish and bone, a tried and tested boost. Buy in a sack of horticultural grit so that when you plant out anything this summer add a handful in the hole to mix with our clay soil. This makes a well-drained and looser environment to get a plant established.

Jobs for This Month

Plants in pots: tip the pot upside down, if it is jammed with roots loosen them a little and select the next size pot - no bigger - and fill the space with some John Innes No.2 soil. If you want them to stay in the original pot, trim a third of the roots back, replace in the pot and fill with said soil. The word "trim" is key - don't go bananas. Water both pots, with rainwater if you have it: this will also move the soil down and around the roots. Top up with a little more soil if needed. If your treatment has been a little drastic but necessary, move the pot into a sheltered place for ten days.

Leave the daffodil leaves to die down until about June, as this is returning food back into the bulbs for next year's display. It is why I plant them at the back of the border behind all the herbaceous which has been cut back.

When tying a supporting stake to a tree, or a climber to a framework use a figure of eight loop to prevent rubbing.

Give a mulch to anything you have pruned and, if you can remember to, anything that looked poorly last season.

Prune dogwood and willows, those with colourful stems, back to two buds from which shoots will grow and provide even more colour next year.

Keeping it Simple

Some easy plants: agapanthus, crocosmia, heucheras, hellebore. With the latter, if you want to have some in a vase, it is more successful if you wait until the anthers have dropped and the plump seed pods have formed. But they will only last about five days.

And Finally

Paths in gardens should lead somewhere, otherwise it disappoints. Shield an eyesore with trellis. Catch the eye with something, from an interesting pot, a bench, something found - like driftwood - or something which is special to you, a view.

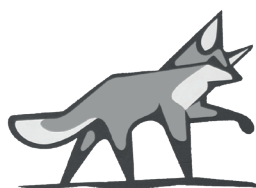
