EDITORIAL JULY 2022

So the Queen's Platinum Jubilee has come and gone, and I think we can agree that a good time was had by all. I'm still trying to understand why we ended up with Bank Holidays on the Thursday and Friday when the main day for celebrating the Jubilee was Sunday (wouldn't it have made more sense to give people a day off on Monday so they could recover from the previous day's excitement?) but I didn't let that conundrum spoil what turned out to be a wonderful celebration of Her Majesty's 70 years at the helm. I must admit most of the events organised for London passed me by, although I did catch a bit of the Party At The Palace concert on the Saturday night which featured a fair old selection of the great and the good from the past 70 years of popular music (and Rod Stewart). No, for me the Jubilee was all about the local events, starting with the lighting of the Jubilee beacon on the Thursday evening behind the Badminton Centenary Hall. Sitting with friends and chatting in the warm sunshine was the perfect way to spend a summer's evening, before walking over to watch the Duke and Duchess light the beacon itself, sending flames shooting high into the night's sky. It was good to get out, meeting friends old and new. And the punch was very agreeable too, by all accounts.

Attention then switched to events on the Sunday. In Badminton, colourful bunting criss-crossed the High Street from one side to the other, fluttering over a line of tables that stretched the full length of this pretty little street. All that was needed to complete the scene was people, and they descended right on cue, picnics in hand, to spend an afternoon in the company of friends and neighbours, chatting about the old days and looking forward to the future. Over in Acton Turville, festivities were being held on the village playing field, where a veritable tented village had sprung up seemingly overnight. There was a tent for the cake stall, a tent for the entertainers, a tent for face painting, a beer tent, even Splat The Rat and Hook A Duck had their own tents. Once again it was great to see so many people turning out and enjoying themselves.

What kept coming up in conversation was just how much people appreciated the way these events brought the whole village together. Talk Back used to regularly report on the various groups who used to meet up on a regular basis, but Covid-related restrictions put paid to a lot of those social gatherings. As the restrictions have been relaxed, some of these events have returned to the calendar but others have fallen by the wayside. It's as if some people lost the appetite for meeting up in large numbers, only for the Jubilee events to remind us just how good it is to get out and gather as a community. We hear there are already conversations taking place about organising future events, and we wish those involved the best of luck.

Something you may have noticed is the increasing number and variety of events being organised by the Badminton Estate. Talk Back regularly reports on the fabulous open gardens which now take place three times a year, and we had some spectacular pictures from the firework competition which was held last year on The Straits. In Memoriam RICHARD RICH

Richard Rich died on the 27th of May and his body will be cremated in Colchester. His ashes will be brought back for a short service in Little Badminton church, prior to internment in the churchyard here in Little Badminton at 2.30pm on 10th August.

Richard was a wonderful character and though I only knew him for five years, he made a lasting impression.

He struggled in those last few years with health issues, both of his mind as well as his body, but he made some significant achievements. The most impressive of which was giving up smoking. This took a great deal of effort and contributed greatly to his overall health.

Richard owned a field in Burton which he would inspect and he would drive in and out of Yate to get provisions. He knew a huge amount about the countryside and was a popular member of the Hunt in earlier years.

Richard's white van for many years could be seen driving around the villages.

He was a regular churchgoer and when he had given up driving, would turn up an hour or so before departure from the Vicarage, in order to hitch a ride. I was fortunate in having many a fascinating conversation with Richard.

His visits to Colchester to see his much-loved sister were followed by returning with armfuls of Tiptree Jam and Marmalade, of which the more fortunate of us were recipients.

We all missed him when he went to live in a care home in Essex near his sister, but it became necessary.

I am sure you have many stories about Richard and I hope we will have a chance to share them, maybe after the burial of his ashes.

SEVINGTON VICTORIAN SCHOOL OPEN DAYS

Sevington Victorian School, near Grittleton, was founded in 1848 by Joseph Neeld to provide an education for the children of his estate workers. Its curriculum was narrow, based on the assumption that the pupils would go on to work either in service or as farm labourers on the Neeld estates. In 1860 Miss Elizabeth Squire was engaged as schoolteacher, and when she retired in 1913, the school closed. Remarkably, the schoolroom was left untouched, providing us with a fascinating glimpse back in time, complete with Miss Squire's desk, pointer and blackboard. Today the school is used as a reenactment centre for primary school children. This year it will be open to the public on the following days.

LIONS TO UKRAINE - UPDATE



In last month's Talk Back we reported how the Chipping Sodbury Lions Club were organising a coach to take urgently-needed food and medical supplies to Ukraine. The plan was to drop the supplies at a warehouse in Krakow, Poland, from where it would be shipped directly to Kyiv for distribution. It was then hoped the coach, generously provided by Turners Coachways of Bristol, would return with a number of Ukrainian

women and children seeking refuge in the UK. Masterminding the endeavour was Ian Gott from Acton Turville who is the Secretary of the Chipping Sodbury Lions Club.

We're delighted to report that the trip was a huge success. Over 1000 kgs of food and medical supplies were transported to the warehouse in Krakow and that has now been shipped to help people

in Kyiv. The coach then returned with 41 Ukrainian refugees who were collected from the drop-off point in Yate by people who would be providing them with homes and shelter all over the country. We hope to bring you a more comprehensive report in a future issue of Talk Back. In the meantime, I'm sure you will join us in congratulating Ian Gott, the Chipping Sodbury Lions Club, Turners Coachways and everybody involved in this extraordinary effort on their achievement. Well done to you all!

J J'S GARDENING BLOG



Now is the time to go garden visiting. Get ideas for planting, and see in what type of soil or in what conditions certain plants like to grow. Buy the Yellow Book or the individual County leaflets for say Gloucestershire or Wiltshire which lists their opening times. A lovely garden to visit is Cothay Manor, near Wellington in Somerset, not exactly just round the corner but special. If holidaying in the UK, keep a copy of the Yellow Book to hand in the car.

Take notes

In a garden journal make a note of plants that slugs leave alone! Some that spring to mind; euphorbia, snap dragons, tobacco plants, rock roses, honeysuckle and others.

Planting Suggestions

Pelargonium one always thinks of for pots, and they are great, colourful and flowering until the first frost, and very happy to be moved around preferably in full sun. The Attar of Roses variant is not so spectacular in flower as some of the other Pelargoniums, but the leaves have a marvellous scent. Put one on a garden table - gorgeous.

If you want something to sway in the breeze, maybe try the ornamental grass Tenuissima, nice to feel too. Perhaps put a few cut-and-come-again lettuces the front of a border or red radicchio - people never notice.

Jobs for This Month

Keep dead heading and feeding.

Tie in Runner Beans, Borlottis. Make sure bean poles are secure.

Top Tips for Top Pots

Plants in pots and other containers are so useful. You can fill them with the correct fresh compost which will have good new nutrients and the right pH to suit either lime haters or lime lovers, according to what plants you are going to put in each container. Remember to let pots dry out between generous watering. The plant food mixed in the compost lasts for about six weeks. After that time, use a liquid feed as per the instructions every two weeks, such as Miracle Grow or Tomorite in a watering can which promotes flowering.

Move the pots around. Near the door to enjoy them or tucked away if past their best.

If you have a big container, maybe grow some lettuce, a tumbling tomato plant or two, dwarf French beans. It's always fun to pick something you've grown and a fun thing to do with the children. Herbs of course are ideal to grow in pots. Just keep various mint plants separately or they will take over.

And Finally

Put a pot you are enjoying for looks or fragrance next to where you sit or linger. This is the month to make sure to place chairs in a good spot and a table for the teapot or wine glass.


