I do enjoy pottering around the garden. I guess I'd describe myself as someone who gardens rather than a gardener, on the basis that I don't really know what I'm doing. I don't let that stop me having a go though. Sometimes the results can be very pleasing, but when that happens it's often more by luck than judgement. Conversely when things go wrong (and believe me, they do), my lack of gardening know-how means I'm not very good at working out what happened and learning from the experience. As a result, there's a good chance I'll make the same mistake again and the replacement plant will suffer the same unfortunate fate. The garden centres must love customers like me. One thing I have learned over the years is to go for plants that are green and big (non-gardeners might like to make a note of that) as they seem to be more sturdy and, unlike bedding plants, are less prone to keeling over if neglected for an extended period of time. Once established, maintenance is likely to be restricted to a quick clip with shears or a bit of pruning with secateurs to keep them tidy. Even I can manage that.

My failure to grasp the basics of gardening is puzzling because I avidly watch programmes like Gardeners World and read every word of JJ's Gardening Blog which our good friend Josephine Jenkinson so kindly prepares for Talk Back every month. I've listened to Monty Don explain how to take cuttings and propagate them over and over again, but for whatever reason I've never actually had a go myself. Similarly while I've got books galore on how to maintain a lawn, my own lawn is comprised almost entirely of moss. At least it's green. Maybe my hesitancy is because I learn best when I have someone explain to me face-to-face how to do these things and to inject a bit of enthusiasm into the learning process. Looking back, it seems that every neighbourhood and workplace had a gardening club where knowledge and experience was shared. For instance, when I started work we had an on-site gardening club with its own potting shed and greenhouse. The membership was entirely made up of elderly gentlemen (although, being a youthful teenager at the time I probably considered the whole workforce to be elderly) who would meet up at lunchtime, tend to their plants and offer advice and guidance as required. Their enthusiastic conversations about all things horticultural would continue when they returned to the office, only stopping when the boss (another elderly gentleman) noisily knocked the tobacco out of his pipe into a large glass ceramic ashtray, peered over the top of his half-moon glasses and made some sarcastic comment about how late everyone would be leaving once they'd made up their hours. Happy days.

And it wasn't just the gardeners who were at it. There was also an on-site radio club where you could take your electronic equipment to be fettled, a motoring club where you could work on your car at lunchtime and hope it would be back in one piece in time for the journey home, and a model-makers club which would put on an annual show covering everything from balsa-wood aircraft to working steam engines. Looking back, this was the age of DIY where people would enjoy the challenge of creating things with their own hands. They would cook meals from scratch, make their own clothes from patterns that came in magazines, and think nothing of transforming a pile of wooden off-cuts into a dubious coffee table. Over the subsequent decades those concepts disappeared and convenience became the buzzword. Supermarkets filled their shelves with ready-made meals that just needed to be zapped in a microwave to create a hearty (if not always nutritious) meal, clothes became so cheap it was hardly worth washing them, let alone repairing them, and the closest that many of us got to DIY was assembling flatpack furniture which, on close inspection, comprised a pile of wooden off-cuts that built up into a dubious coffee table.

There might be signs that attitudes are changing though. Platforms such as YouTube are full of videos which show you how to fix all manner of items, dispelling the myth that the only option when something fails is to dispose of it. Television is doing its bit too; people are rediscovering the joys of cooking and baking, encouraged by programmes such as Masterchef and Bake Off, and you can't move for restoration programmes like The Repair Shop where the battered remains of previously-cherished trinkets are miraculously transformed and given a new lease of life. I wonder if there's an appetite to take the next step and set up local groups like we used to have all those years ago, sharing knowledge and experience with other like-minded individuals, offering support and encouragement when things go awry and recognising achievements when things go well? Wouldn't that be nice.

We could start with my lawn. Make sure you bring a rake.

Music In Country Churches




I Came, I Saw, I Moved to the Village By Jeanette White, Badminton

'm not sure how old I was when I first heard of the Badminton Three Day Event, or even when I realised that the village of Badminton was not a million miles away from Hambrook where I lived. What I do know is that, at some point, I had to get there no matter what!!

I was the original "pony mad girl" without a pony of her own (until the age of 45 that is) and I just had to be content with cadging rides whenever I could on local ponies and looking after them when their owners were away.

I think I thought that Badminton was a bigger version of the local gymkhanas that I loved to attend so go I must, and it had to be on cross country day. My parents couldn't help me as they had a busy shop to run so I devised a way of getting there under my own steam, so to speak. By bus!!

This did not go down with my parents who flatly refused to allow it and looking back who can blame them when I was only thirteen and three quarters years old at the time, but after much wailing and ranting from me they eventually gave in as long as I took a friend with me.



So it was that my best school pal Shirley (who was totally non-horsey) got roped in. She lived in Rangeworthy so came down to stay the night before. Actually it's only just occurred to me that she did an almost circular trip to get to Badminton! It was April 1962 and the day of our great adventure had arrived. We didn't have far to travel at first as the bus stop to Bristol was right outside of our house. We caught the bus into Bristol bus station to link up with the Badminton/Malmesbury bus. I can't remember the actual journey but I'm sure it must have seemed to take forever, but when we eventually alighted at the bus shelter in Old Down Road our first task was to find a telephone box as we had received strict instructions to let our parents know we had arrived safely.

We somehow arrived first at the steeplechase course and I have a feeling that we thought in our naivety that it was the actual cross-country course at first. We then saw some riders emerging from the woods which we later learned were the roads and tracks and followed them over to The Park. We had a quick look around the shops but there was not a lot of interest to girls of our age, so we sat under a tree to eat our packed lunches. A distinguished looking man strode past, smiled at us and said "good morning girls, hope you're enjoying yourselves". We nearly choked on our sandwiches when we realised it was The Duke himself!

The cross country had started by now so we made our way around the course. I was shocked and amazed at the size and build of the jumps. They looked so much scarier up close than they did on the telly and we held our breath every time horse and rider soared over them. There didn't seem to be more than 20 people on some of the jumps and there were strategically placed straw bales to sit on. We were doing just this when there was a bit of a commotion a few yards away and we turned to see a group of people clambering out of a couple of Land Rovers. On closer inspection it turned out to be The Queen and it seemed most of the Royal Family. I'm sure they must have had bodyguards about somewhere but they were not obvious. We couldn't have been closer to them if we tried. I can't imagine that happening in this day and age.

We had intended to walk the whole course but as we circled back towards the arena we discovered to my delight that there was show jumping going on in there, completely unconnected to the event. Not only that, but all my heroes were competing, not least David Broome and Harvey Smith. I think you had to pay or have tickets to get into the arena so we watched it all through a gap in the far corner, a place from which I was to watch the Sunday final show jumping for many years to come (although there was a blind spot at the top end of the ring where one had to guess what was happening!).

We then loitered around the collecting ring and managed to get David and Harvey's autographs. Sadly there were no mobiles to take selfies on in those days – in fact I didn't even possess a camera!

The winner that year was Annilee Drummond Hay and I remember her coming into the collecting ring on the beautiful Merely A Monarch after successfully completing the cross country.

Sadly our wonderful day was coming to an end. If I had one criticism it would be the toilets; they were so dreadful. Thank you to whoever invented the portaloo! That is all I have to say on the subject!!

Now two very weary girls, Shirley and I made our way back to the bus shelter where my dad was picking us up at 6 o'clock.

That day was the very beginning of my Badminton adventures and the most memorable. Against all the odds, Shirley must have enjoyed it as she accompanied me on a few more occasions over the years. A number of friends and work colleagues got dragged along as well.

Once I had passed my driving test I was free to make my own way but couldn't afford the parking fee so would park in the yard of a farmer I knew and walk miles across the fields to get in.

I then applied to become a parking attendant on cross country day which was wonderful as I could get in for free, get paid, and finish in time to watch most of the cross country before spending my earnings in the shops!

I then met my husband to be and it transpired that he was a "Special Policeman" in his spare time and did the three-day event every year. He got to park in the police compound and could take passengers in as well. Nearly every year he was stationed on the Luckington Lane jump and got to know some of the regular visitors. One of those was a young lady who came with her parents. She had special needs but always looked out for her favourite policeman and gave him a sweet. Her parents took a photo of them both one year and very kindly sent him a copy which I still have somewhere. He was also amused by a little old man who would turn up in his Rolls Royce and sit on the tailgate eating his sandwiches which were apparently always fishpaste.

Over the years the event became bigger and bigger, especially after Princess Anne rode there and created a lot of publicity. I may have missed a few when my two sons came along, but as soon as they were old enough they would be dragged along and the same with grandchildren. I think they all enjoyed it really.

I have many happy memories of the Badminton Horse trials as it is now known but that first visit will always remain foremost in my mind.

If someone had told me all those years ago that I would actually end up living here in the village I would never have believed them in a million years!

Jane Tuckwell - Directing Operations at the Badminton Horse Trials

Back in 1999, Ray Bird produced a magazine to celebrate the 50th anniversary of the Badminton Horse Trials. Among those who contributed was Jane Tuckwell who at the time was Secretary of the horse trials. Jane went on to become event Director in 2019 but, with the 2020 and 2021 events cancelled, 2022 will be Jane's first actual running of the horse trials in that role. All of us at Local Talk Back send our best wishes for a very successful event – may it be the first of many.

We thought readers might be interested to read some extracts from that 1999 interview which explain how Jane found herself in the event office and captured the mounting excitement as the event drew near.

"I was out hunting when Lt Col Frank Weldon rode up and asked me if I would like to lend a hand in the office after Christmas. He told me in no way would my work interrupt my hunting - which proved to be quite true! So, I started that year, 1974, at the age of seventeen, as Assistant Secretary to Jenny Blackie and later Victoria Ayshford-Sanford, both of whom I am indebted to as they taught me all they could before I became Secretary in 1984.

No two Badmintons are ever the same, each having its own unique atmosphere and challenge, be it the weather, number of entries or whatever. We all work throughout the year towards that one week and it is just as exciting now as it was when I first started as the event draws closer and all the people involved come together, culminating in the tradestands, the competitors and their horses arriving. Then before one knows where one is – it is the prizegiving in the Main Arena and then it is time to start getting ready for next year!!"

This is an area of Outstanding Natural Beauty and we have requested an alternative method be used for future events._

THE VILLAGE CLUB IN HORSE TRIALS WEEK.

Following two years of cancellation due to coronavirus restrictions, it's great to see the Badminton Horse Trials back this year. During those cancelled years, one significant change that has occurred in the village has been the closure in 2020 of the Badminton Village Club, which over the years had played such a social part of the event for many people.

As a club it had served the community since 1912, and before that it had been The Portcullis Inn since at least the late 18th/early 19th century,



hence had been the local venue to enjoy a drink and meet friends for around 200 years. That was particularly true once the horse trials began in 1949, and I am sure many of you will have memories of the part it played in your life, whether it was making new friends from all corners of the globe, or the meeting location for re-unions with ex-villagers making their annual pilgrimage back for the event.

My own earliest memories of making new friends there during the horse trials goes back to the 1960's, and would begin weeks before the event. Back then the trials were held in April and from around early March the construction firm of Woodhouse would arrive to put up the grandstands, shedding and loos (no portaloos then!). For many of the Woodhouse workers, from the weeks before the event until everything had been dismantled, the club became their nightly watering hole. Being mainly the same workers that came back year after year, us locals that used the club got to know them well, and some were to remain friends with villagers long after the firm ceased coming.

Back in the 60s and 70s, the club was very much at the heart of the night life for many visitors during the horse trials week, and each evening it really would be jam packed. In later years the number of visitors began to decline, and I believe there were two main reasons for this. Firstly, the event itself has changed: the more intense pressures of the event in later years, with its high valued horses, rider sponsorship and good prize money, means taking a much more serious approach and a virtual 24-hour watch on the horses, whereas the event in those earlier years was much more "laid back" and many of the owners, riders and grooms treated it more as a fun week away. That is not to say the horses did not receive proper care, but for many when the day's duties were over, with the exception of perhaps a quick check on the horse before going to bed, most were left to their own devices so to speak, and those involved would be free to spend the evening as they pleased, which often meant a night in the club. Secondly we have seen the opening of the evening bar and entertainment in the Park in more recent years, which no doubt accounted for some stallholders, exhibitors and campers etc who would previously have headed for the Village Club.

This article though is not about club numbers, but of friendships, and I think I probably speak for many of you when I say, while those well used words over the years of - "we will meet you down the club", may have gone forever, the memories of new friends made, and old ones renewed there during the horse trials, will live on forever.

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
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Badminton House Open Gardens
